As much as I would like to report that the Veterans Small Business Enhancement Act that was signed into law on January 3, 2019 has been implemented, that is not the case.

However, I can report that even with things moving at a snail's pace, it is at least moving. Since the Act amends Title 15, which is the Small Business Act, it has been determined that the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) will be charged with promulgating regulations to effectuate the Act. As SBA continues to prepare for implementation, both GSA and NASASP reached out offering any assistance with creating policy or the needed memorandum of understanding between the SBA and the States. We will try our best to keep you all updated as we move forward. Please have a little patience. My hope is that we will have this program up and in place by the time we meet in July at the Annual Meeting in Richmond, VA. Please see the next page for a meeting preview. Hope to see you all there!

Veteran Care Centers of Oregon (Oregon)



This 2008 Harley Davidson Electra-Glide Police Special was acquired from California's Golden Gate National Park. It was transferred to Veteran Care Centers of Oregon, located in Salem, Oregon, in March 2018. The idea behind this acquisition was to customize the bike and use it for promoting VCCO, as well as give the residents an uplifting piece of art to enjoy.

VCCO specializes in providing transitional and permanent housing to veterans, and operates the Oregon Veterans Home located in The Dalles, Oregon. They will be using the bike for parades, bike shows, and most importantly, it will be displayed throughout the year at the different Veteran Care Center locations.

Many sponsors have helped with the financial aspect of the restoration, while most of the work was done by volunteers. The original government acquisition was \$26,700 and the service charge to the Donee was \$5,000. That's a savings of over \$21,000 compared to buying brand new!

Division of Highways (West Virginia)



West Virginia Division of Highways Stretches Dollars Thanks to the Federal Surplus Donation Program

Drivers in some West Virginia communities had clearer roads to drive on this winter thanks to the West Virginia State Agency for Surplus Property (WVSASP).

The West Virginia Division of Highways received six Freightliners through the General Services Administration's (GSA) Federal Surplus Property donation program. The trucks were converted into snowplows and salt spreaders for use on some West Virginia's highways.

"It would have cut us short somewhere else if we had to buy this equipment," said Travis Ray of the Division of Highways office in Buckhannon, West Virginia.

West Virginia's segment of its Corridor H highway crosses very mountainous terrain even in the best weather conditions. Therefore, it's important to keep the roads clear and safe during what is usually a harsh winter.

"We had a mild winter this past year but we expect these trucks to be used a lot more in the future as this area receives more snow," Ray said.

WVSASP is proud to administer this program and assist state agencies and eligible organizations with receiving federal donated property.

Timber Lakes Volunteer Fire Department (Texas)

Since joining the Federal Surplus Property Program in 2017, Timber Lakes VFD received 6 items, including tools, two 2.5 ton trucks, and equipment for their trucks. The service charge paid to the Texas SASP totals \$12,178, compared to the original government acquisition cost of \$290,975. That's a total savings of \$278,797 compared to buying brand new!

Josh Kennedy, Timber Lakes VFD's Fire Chief, provided these photos and the following story about their 2.5 ton truck being put to use.

"Timber Lakes is a small fire department located about 30 minutes north of Houston, TX in Montgomery County. We have two large creeks going through our area. When we get a good heavy rain for days the subdivision floods, and we are blocked off from the outside world. About 3 years ago, we knew we had to get something that could help us evacuate people from high water that were not threatened in any way. We turned to the Texas Facilities Commission to look at the 2.5 tons and 5 tons you had on your lot in the first part of August 2018, not knowing we would have to put it to use 3 weeks later for Hurricane Harvey. This truck was a lifesaver for the amount of people it moved out of high water to dry land so THANK YOU for giving us the opportunity to get one."

Bowman Community Volunteer Fire Department (Texas)



Bowman Community Volunteer Fire Department has received 748 items from the Texas SASP, including medical supplies, tools, generators, vehicles, and firefighting and rescue equipment. The service charges paid totals \$42,649, compared to the original government acquisition cost of \$918,133. That's a total savings of \$875,484 compared to buying brand new! Additionally, the VFD also was featured in by their local news (NewsChannel 6 out of Wichita Falls, TX) for the acquisition of a generator from the Texas SASP.

Bowman VFD buys generator for whole community

WICHITA FALLS, TX (TNN) - After a severe thunderstorm in the Bowman area led to the loss of power for three days for many residents, the Bowman Fire Department decided to buy a new generator.

The military grade unit was bought using some funds left over from their annual budget.

Officials say it's not just for the fire station, but for the entire community.

Firefighters say they got it especially for those that depend on electricity to run home health devices where it can be dangerous to lose power for days at a time.

Officials say the generator will be available for mutual aid partners and the community wherever it is needed.

Donee Success Story

Boles Independent School District (Texas)

Since joining the Federal Surplus Property Program, Boles ISD has received 125 items, including band instruments, tools, welding equipment, generators, art supplies, office supplies, furniture, and shipping containers. The service charges paid to the Texas SASP totals \$26,572, compared to the original government acquisition cost of \$426,456. That's a total savings of \$399,884 compared to buying brand new!



Alvarado Independent School District (Texas)

Since joining FSP, Alvarado ISD received 47 items, including band instruments, school supplies, furniture, FEMA meal kits, and a forklift. The service charges paid to the Texas SASP totals \$18,754, compared to the original government acquisition cost of \$129,183. That's a total savings of \$110,429 compared to buying brand new!

Seymour Hospital (Texas)

Since joining the Federal Surplus Property Program, Seymour Hospital, located in Baylor County, TX has acquired 53 items, including instrument trays, medical waste bins, office supplies, furniture, sterile gowns, heaters, a golf cart, kitchen appliances, and medical equipment. In June 2018, Seymour Hospital received four Stryker hospital beds with an original value of \$5,000/ea., however they paid the Texas SASP a service charge of only \$200/ea. The service charges paid for all 53 item totals \$8,738, compared to the original government acquisition cost of \$87,699, for a total savings of \$78,961 compared to buying brand new!



Donee Success Story

St. Hedwig Volunteer Fire Department (Texas)

St. Hedwig VFD converted a 5 ton M1083 into a brush truck. Their service charge was \$5,500, compared to the original government acquisition cost of \$134,047, saving a total of \$128,547 compared to buying brand new! After receiving the truck, St. Hedwig VFD gave the truck a complete makeover. They had the truck painted and added a tank, pump, cage, hose lines, monitor, bumper sweeps, as well as emergency and scene lighting. What a transformation!



Donee Success Story

Lake City Police Department (Florida)

Lake City Police Department of Lake City, FL received 2 freight containers and four locker storage units from the Florida SASP. The original acquisition cost was \$11,035.03 and was donated with a service cost of \$1,625. That is a total savings of \$9,410.03 for the police department when compared to buying brand new!



Martin County Sheriff's Office (Florida)

Lt. Dowdy drove all the way to Starke, FL to pick up a new air conditioner/heating 25kw generator from the Florida SASP warehouse. The acquisition cost was \$98,000 and was donated with a service cost of \$9,000, for a total savings of \$89,000 when compared to buying brand new!

Union County High School (Florida)

Union County School Band of Lake Butler, FL received an English horn from the Florida SASP. The original acquisition cost was \$5,994 and was donated with service charge of \$200, for a total savings of \$5,794 compared to buying brand new. Kelly Dorsey, Director of Bands emailed: "Here is the picture of the English Horn. It is BEAUTIFUL!!!! OMG!!!! This was one of the BEST finds yet! I truly appreciate it :) :)"



Northside Christian Academy (Florida)

Northside Christian Academy of Starke, FL received three items from the Florida SASP. A file cabinet had an original acquisition cost of \$528.74 and was donated with service cost of \$100, for a total savings of \$428.74 compared to buying brand new. A desk chair had an original acquisition cost of \$275 and was donated with service cost of \$30, for a total savings of \$245 compared to buying brand new. This storage cabinet had an original acquisition cost of \$745.21 and was donated with service cost of \$50, for a total savings of \$695.21 compared to buying brand new. In total, that is an original acquisition cost of \$1,548.95, service charge of \$180 for an overall savings of \$1,368.95!

Donee Success Story

Military Machines of American Freedom (Florida)

Military Machines of American Freedom located in Quincy, FL has been part of Florida's Federal Surplus Property Program since November 2013. The M1078 cargo truck that the Museum received had an original acquisition cost of \$104,626, but paid a service charge of \$1,100, for a savings of \$103,526 compared to buying brand new. The Museum also received a Humvee for a service charge of \$1,000 with original an acquisition cost of \$47,023, for a savings of \$46,023 compared to buying brand new. On just these two pieces of property, the Museum has saved a total of \$149,549!

According to the Museum, "You may recognize two of the vehicles as ones you were responsible for us getting through federal surplus - the M1078 Cargo Truck and the M998 Humvee. They looked great in the display. Military Machines of American Freedom supplied all the military vehicles for display. This is the second year we have assisted with this event, all at no charge, to honor our military veteran's. Other than being a bit toasty, it was a great event and the veterans and the public enjoyed the event."



Below is a letter from Museum President, Kevin Vislocky to the Florida SASP from November 2018:

Military Machines of American Freedom is back in business!! We took a hit from Hurricane Michael. We definitely did not get hit as bad as some areas like Mexico Beach but we received significant damage for a small community. We lost power, telephone and internet for 8 days, which is really just an inconvenience compared with what most folks are having to deal with in harder hit areas.

We had many trees and power lines down everywhere but suffered no damage to our restoration hangar. We moved as much as we could inside before the hurricane hit but unfortunately our OH6 "Little Bird" helicopter was flipped onto its side and suffered sheet metal damage and a broken upper window. We can repair this damage. No Federal Surplus acquired property was damaged.

After we cleared our entry road of 8 downed trees, we rendered aid to the City of Quincy clearing several miles on Highway 12 of downed trees using our Federal Surplus supplied UniMog front end loaders. The City of Quincy does not have the infrastructure to handle a large scale disaster. We were also called upon to assist several elderly home owners in the area to remove trees to allow them access in and out of their homes. We also set up our Federal Surplus acquired generators to supply power to some needy area homes sharing power from each generator to power multiple homes. So, the point here is the Federal Surplus you helped us acquire is not only serving our organization, but serving our community during a disaster recovery.

On a bright note, after the hurricane, we took delivery of our newly acquired "Patrol Boat River (PBR)" Vietnam river patrol boat. We were able to take it to the Perry Forest Festival parade and exhibition. The boat was accompanied by our Federal Surplus acquired M1078 troop carrier/cargo truck. It was a great event, a beautiful day, lots of exposure for our organization and a welcome change for everyone from dealing with the hurricane damage.

So, that is an update on what has been going on, and to also say thank you for all the assistance you have provided. THANK YOU!!



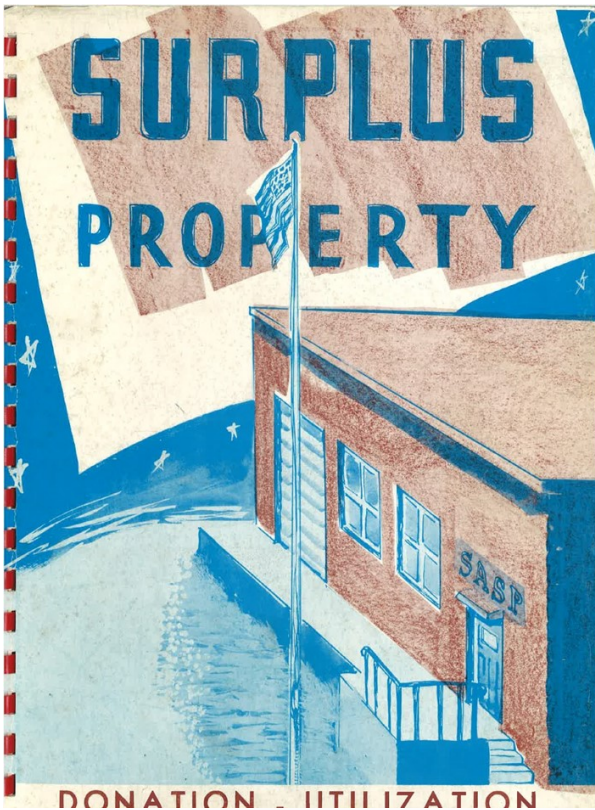

FUNCTIONAL RESPONSIBILITIES

- Promotes, coordinates, and executes a program for the utilization of personal property by Federal agencies, authorizes transfers of excess personal property between such agencies and determines when Federal property is surplus to the needs of the Government.
- Plans and conducts sales of surplus or other personal property of Federal civil agencies, or assists such agencies, in the conduct of sales.
- Reviews application in Federal agencies of policies and procedures prescribed by GSA to govern the utilization or disposition of personal property, and provides advice and assistance as requested.
- Executes a program for the donation of surplus personal property for educational, public health, and civil defense purposes, and to eligible service educational activities, the American Red Cross, and other eligible organizations.
- Directs the delay or discontinuance of any proposed sale or donation of surplus personal property when such action is determined to be in the Government's interest.
- Arranges for the repair and rehabilitation of personal property of Federal agencies, other than motor equipment, by commercial facilities, by other Federal agencies, or by the operation of GSA repair shops.

THIS IS MY LIFE

I am Mr. T. Freeze, (T, for temporary), Form 141. I came into being at the office of the property disposal officer under the hand of the HEW screener. The screener records certain pertinent information about the property he has screened. Immediately I lose one of my coats (copy) which is left with the PDO. Then I travel with the screener to the State Director's office. Next I am sent to the office of the Regional Representative, where I am settled by Mr. Freeze, Form 136.



I am the real Mr. Freeze, Form 136. I first see light in the Regional HEW office. I am associated with both reported and non-reported property. I have a comparatively short life of only forty days. My mission is to alert all parties involved that certain properties are desired and needed by eligible schools, hospitals, or civil defense units. I am well dressed, with several identical coats which I wear one over the other. From the regional HEW office I travel to GSA for approval. I leave one of my coats as evidence of having been there. They "laundry and" my other coats so that others may know of my travels. I finally come to rest at the holding agency, and HEW. If I am not too weary, I may also report to SASP as information. Mr. 135 relieves me.



I am Mr. Application, Form 135. I wake up happy in the SASP office. Everybody rejoices except my nurse maid (typist); she always wrings me up in nine coats, some in colors. It does give me an important feeling until she changes her mind and starts separating my clothing. If I represent property within the region, I immediately lose five coats to the HEW regional office. If another region is involved, they remove another. The remainder of my clothing is kept by the SASP for various purposes. When I finally come to rest, I find that a part of me is visiting with everyone who had anything to do with the information that I carried. (SASP, PDO, HEW)

Successful Shipment from Germany

A 1998 KME 4x4 fire truck with 19,566 miles on it was shipped from Germersheim, Germany to Nebraska. The shipping cost was \$13,880 to door. The original government acquisition cost was \$217,297. The truck was transferred to the Trenton Rural Fire District located in the southwest corner of Nebraska which has a population of 560. It was donated for \$25,000. According to the fire department, "The community was so glad to be able to acquire a truck of this caliber. It has been a great asset for this area to have such a nice piece of fire fighting equipment."

NASASP Government Relations Report

Veteran Bill Passes into Law-2019 Brings Changes to SASP's

With hard work and persistence, NASASP is now in a very exclusive "Club." Not a club where you can exercise or host someone for dinner, but exclusive nonetheless—it is a 4% "Club" in which each Congress, during its two years of Sessions (115th Cong. 2017-2018), produces over 5,000 bills that are introduced in the US House and Senate but only 4% of these ever go thru the entire process to be signed into Public Law by the President. That is exactly which happened to NASASP. On January 3, 2019, our "Veterans Small Business Enhancement Act" became Public Law 115-416 to provide access to the 2.5M veterans around the country who own small businesses. It did not happen by itself—our bi-partisan sponsors Senators Duckworth (D-IL) and Kennedy (R-LA), the Chairman of the Senate Small Business Committee last year Sen. Risch (R-ID), Veterans Service Organizations (such as the American Legion, Association of the US Army, Military Officers Association of America and many others), individual veterans, many of our NASASP past and present officers, and state officials worked with us to move this small (24 line bill) to a unanimous passage in the Senate and a 385-to-1 vote passage in the House. This was a very swift and bipartisan effort to help the veteran community. We worked with the leadership in the US House and Senate to get this done before the end of the last Congress. Kudos to NASASP as this is the second Public Law passed in five years by our organization (the first law permitted

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Veterans Service Organizations to access federal surplus property through SASPs). NASASP officers are now working very hard with the appropriate agencies—GSA, SBA and VA—to finalize the regulations and procedures for accommodating this new group of veteran businesses seeking to take advantage of the Federal Surplus Property Program (FSPP).

In 2019, one of the top NASASP priorities underway in the new Congress is to advocate for donations to be considered in the law before exchange/sale. This bill seeks to change Title 40 and will require a great effort to educate new staffs and Congress members with jurisdiction over GSA. This year, the new 116th Congress (which will last 2019 to 2020) has been active for four months. GSA policies and changes to Title 40 have come under new US House Committee leadership (which has frequently been in the news lately) - the Oversight and Reform Committee, headed by Rep. Cummings (D-MD) and Ranking Republican, Rep. Jordan (R-OH). The House's Subcommittee on Government Operations, which has interests in GSA, is chaired by Rep. Connolly (D-VA), and Ranking Member, Rep. Meadows (R-NC).

The counterpart committee in the US Senate is the same from last Congress—Senate Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs, which is chaired by Sen. Johnson (R-WI) and Ranking Member, Sen. Peters (D-MI). SASPs can assist NASASP by answering our “call” to help on this “donations over exchange/sale” issue in the weeks to come. New leadership brings new top staffs who need to be educated on the FSPP and issues SASPs face each day.

In the area of DLA and DoD operations, we are active on various issues, including impacting the National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA) which is created and passed each year and contains provisions on DLA and DoD. In last year's bill, reports to the Congress are being watched for impacts on DeMil policies that include unnecessary destruction (scrapping) of vehicles, as well as changes to the logistics and acquisition structure of DoD. A new NDAA for Fiscal Year 2020 will be created starting in April. NASASP will be involved in this process. New House and Senate Committee leaders in the Armed Services Committees include a new Chairman for the US House, Rep. Smith (R-OR), and in the Senate, Sen. Inhofe (R-OK). DLA FY2020 operations and policies are a key priority for NASASP in the Congress and government.

In 2019, we will also see other actions within the Congress that might impact donees and the FSPP. We interact with the House and Senate Small Business committees that oversee and influence SBA policies. There will be issues that are key to NASASP, including the 8(a) program. Some members of Congress seek to “create” new federal surplus property programs without the knowledge of our FSPP and SASPs. Last Congress, our vigilance stopped a veteran farmer surplus equipment “idea,” as well as a whole project involving surplus property and reconditioning computers for donation. Title 40 amendments will arise during this Congress and require action—such as another initiative of NASASP to expand access to the Service Educational Activities (such as Boys and Girls clubs, Boys and Girl Scouts, Red Cross, and other groups) beyond the DoD to all federal agencies.

While the US Congress is large and ever-changing—with 535 elected officials, 2,000 personal and committee top staff, and many more to monitor, report and impact—NASASP can be assured that federal activity is well covered and efforts are underway to benefit the association, SASPs and donees.
