## A VICTORY FOR VETERANS AND NASASP!

On January 3, 2019, President Trump signed Public Law 15-416 into law. NASASP has been working on Capitol Hill to ensure passage of this bipartisan bill, S.2679, also known as the "Veterans Small Business Enhancement Act," as reported by John Chwat, Director of Government Relations for NASASP. The bill passed unanimously through the U.S. Senate on December 6, 2018. At the last minute before Congress left for the Christmas vacation, we received support from Majority Leader Rep. Kevin McCarthy (R-CA) to schedule the vote in the House on the Senate-approved bill. On December 20th, it passed the House of Representatives by a vote of 385 to 1. This bill, which was introduced by Senator Tammy Duckworth (D-Illinois) and cosponsored by Senator John Neely Kennedy (R-Louisiana), allows veterans who own small business to expand economic opportunity by acquiring equipment and property through the Federal Surplus Property Program similar to how women- and minority-owned small businesses and Veterans Service Organizations do today. NASASP, working in concert with John Chwat's Washington, D.C. connections, secured support for the Legislation from many veteran organizations, including the Military Officers Association of America, Association of the USA, and American Legion, as well as most of the leadership in the United States Congress. There are more than 2.5 million veteran-owned small businesses across the country. As more Iraq and Afghanistan-era veterans transition out of the military and begin their next career, this number will only increase. We need to do everything that we can to help our Veterans succeed, and this bill does exactly that! This is a win for our Veterans and a win for our SASPs! NASASP will be working with GSA, VA, and SBA to establish the rules to implement this new law. John informed me that only 4.5% of the over five thousand bills introduced in Congress during the last session became public law. This is a great achievement!

# Veterans Small Business Enhancement Act of 2018

115<sup>th</sup> CONGRESS 2d Session

S. 2679

#### AN ACT

To provide access to and manage the distribution of excess or surplus property to veteran-owned small businesses.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

#### **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

This Act may be cited as the "Veterans Small Business Enhancement Act of 2018".

#### SEC. 2. ACCESS TO SURPLUS PROPERTY FOR VETERAN-OWNED SMALL BUSINESSES.

Section 32 of the Small Business Act (15 U.S.C. 657b) is amended by adding at the end the following:

"(g) ACCESS TO SURPLUS PROPERTY FOR VETERAN-OWNED SMALL BUSINESSES.—

"(1) DEFINITIONS.—In this subsection—

"(A) the term 'foreign excess property' has the meaning given the term in section 102 of title 40, United States Code; and

"(B) the term 'state agency' has the meaning given the term, including the roles and responsibilities assigned, in section 549 of title 40, United States Code.

"(2) REQUIREMENT.—The Administrator, in coordination with the Administrator of General Services, shall provide access to and manage the distribution of surplus property, and foreign excess property returned to a State for handling as surplus property, owned by the United States under chapter 7 of title 40, United States Code, to small business concerns owned and controlled by veterans (as verified by the Secretary of Veterans Affairs under section 8127 of title 38, United States Code) pursuant to a memorandum of agreement between the Administrator, the Administrator of General Services, and the head of the applicable state agency for surplus properties and in accordance with section 549 of title 40, United States Code."



# Hogan Administration Donates Resources to Bladensburg to Help Modernize Public Schools

535 Computers and Accessories Provided Totaling Over \$535,000

**ANNAPOLIS, MD** - Lt. Governor Boyd Rutherford today joined the Maryland Department of General Services (DGS) in partnership with the Governor's Office of Community Initiatives (GOCI) and Bladensburg Mayor Takisha James to announce the donation of 535 computers and accessories to the Town of Bladensburg in Prince George's County. The donation is valued at over \$535,000. DGS and GOCI are proud to announce this unprecedented event, which marks the first time that an incorporated township has received a donation of this size, through the Federal Surplus Donation program, to benefit the public schools within their jurisdiction.

"Our administration remains strongly committed to leveraging every available resource to help Marylanders in need," said Lt. Governor Rutherford. "These computers will serve as tools to help students bridge the digital divide existing in our underserved communities."

The donation was made possible through General Services Administration's (GSA) Federal Surplus Donation program. As the designated Maryland state agency to receive surplus property through the GSA, DGS administers the program, which enables eligible, non-federal organizations to obtain surplus property no longer required by the federal government - at no cost.

"Today's donation was made possible because of the state's focused outreach and network-building to deliver surplus property to Marylanders in need," said DGS Secretary Ellington E. Churchill. "These computers will provide essential access to technology for students and local residents."

The Town of Bladensburg received 535 Dell desktop computers, including a 24-inch flat screen monitor for each computer and all related accessories. The following public schools, along with the Bladensburg Community Center, received computers:

- Bladensburg High School: 250 Dell desktops,
- Templeton Elementary School: 120 Dell desktops,
- Port Towns Elementary School: 100 Dell desktops, and
- Bladensburg Community Outreach Office: 4 Dell desktops.



The remaining computers were donated to Bladensburg Elementary School, Elizabeth Seton High School, International High School at Langley Park, and Rogers Heights Elementary School.

"On behalf of the Bladensburg Community, I am extremely grateful for the computer donations we received thanks to the generosity of Lt. Governor Rutherford and Secretary Churchill," said Bladensburg Mayor James. "These donations will ensure that our students have access to online educational tools to enhance their knowledge and cultivate the necessary technological skills to make them competitive in the future."

# **Bradford County Sheriff's Office (Florida)**

Bradford County Sheriff's Office of Bradford, FL received a metal detector, x-ray machine and wand from the Florida SASP warehouse. The acquisition cost was \$40,730.00 and was donated with a service cost of \$400.00. When compared to buying brand new, that is a total savings of \$40,330.00 for Sheriff Gordon Smith and his Department.





# Department of Transportation, Chiefland, FL (Florida)

Department of Transportation Chiefland, FL received a storage container from the Florida SASP warehouse. The acquisition cost was \$8,919.65 and was donated with service cost of \$200.00, a total savings of \$8,719 when compared to buying brand new.



# **Flagler County Emergency Services (Florida)**

The Florida SASP received a surprise visit from Flagler county Emergency Services who received a floor scrubber machine from the Florida SASP warehouse. The acquisition cost was \$989.95 and was donated with a service cost of \$100.00 for a total savings of \$898.95 when compared to buying brand new. It was a pleasure having the team here at the SASP Warehouse.








# **Holmes County Sheriff's Office (Florida)**

RE: Hurricane Harvey Repairs



Jefferson County Drainage District No. 6 ("DD6") is just a small drainage district in southeast Texas. As you are probably aware from all of the national news casts surrounding Hurricane Harvey, this area was slammed with 45+ inches of rain in a three to four-day period. DD6 is not considered a "first responder" per se in events of this nature, but we did provide aid to multiple county and governmental agencies. My stories are not lifesaving in most ways, but I would like to thank Federal Surplus for the program they have that enabled DD6 to help where we could. This is a brief story of how Federal Surplus property was used during the landmark event called Hurricane Harvey.

During Hurricane Harvey, the City of Beaumont lost its water pressure and was unable to provide water to all of its citizens. The City reached out to DD6 for help. We were able to transport large sandbags from the Sabine Pass area to the City of Beaumont's Utility District. DD6 utilized every trailer in our fleet including the military trailers and vehicles acquired through the Federal Surplus Program in an attempt to save the City of Beaumont's water generator plant.

DD6 also used the District's 140-ton Manitowoc crane to load large boxes that were needed to set water pumps on at the City of Beaumont's Utility District. These large boxes were hauled to utility districts via Federal Surplus trailers.

# **Jefferson County Drainage District No. 6 (Texas)**

The City of Beaumont did not have any water pressure during this time. DD6 was able to retrofit a 6-inch water pump, acquired through the Federal Surplus program, to provide the only source of water to fill firetrucks for the entire City of Beaumont.

DD6's crew operated 5-ton and  $2\frac{1}{2}$ -ton trucks during and after the storm for recovery and observations of the District's assets and projects.

DD6 has always worked with local city and county entities during emergency events such as Hurricane Harvey, and we feel that the Federal Surplus property, which we have acquired through your program, was truly an asset and facilitated our ability to aid others in a time of great despair. This equipment never let us down through the entire event.

We are very grateful for this wonderful program you offer and just want to extend our sincere appreciation to you for what you do.

The Texas SASP would like to thank Mr. Auer and the rest of the Jefferson County Drainage District No. 6 team for their decades of support of the Federal Surplus Property Program. The DD6 team is the perfect example of a local government agency's commitment to maximizing public funds to benefit to their community. Their creative use of Federal Surplus equipment has truly been a pleasure for the Texas SASP to watch. Since October 2009, DD6 has received over 400 items from the Texas SASP with an original value of over \$5.3 million, but paid only around \$285k in service charges. That is almost 95% savings compared to buying brand new! Texas SASP staff often use DD6 as an example of how and why to use the program when performing outreach to potential donees at conferences and trainings. The leadership and inspiration that DD6 provides to similar organizations regarding how to use the program is apparent in the positive feedback we receive from other donees.

## Temple Museum of Modern Warfare (Texas)



The Temple Museum of Modern Warfare in Temple, TX displays items dating back to WWI. The website explains the Museum intends to be a place where people can see, feel, and experience items used during conflicts that shaped the news and World we see today.

Since joining FSP in 2016, the Museum has acquired 225 items. The service charges total \$106,067, compared to the original government acquisition cost of \$3,375,306, saving a total of \$3,269,239 compared to buying brand new! Dave Demorrow, the Museum's Director, submitted the Humvee photo seen above with a story about the vehicle's pink paint. "In the mid 1980s, the US Army was going from one paint pattern to another (4 to 3 colors) and was trying to come up with a proper color for the desert. There was a test unit in New Mexico that was testing the ROLAND ADA, system for Europe, and possible sales to the US ARMY (never happened). This battalion 5/200th ADA was ordered to test out desert pink. The UK had been using the pink in the deserts around the world from WWI to today (SAS pink panther land rovers). They found out that desert pink is harder to see at long ranges than desert tan. For 1-2 years, many of the vehicles in the battalion were painted pink. When I got this vehicle and took off the sand areas guess what? Under it was pink...turns out that this is one of the original test vehicles. I have replicated the color the best I can with the markings and unit numbers."

The Museum received multiple Humvees from FSP that will be shown at the museum expansion, the National HMMWV Museum. Additionally, a big thanks to Dave for helping the Texas SASP create a brochure giving information and tips on utilizing Humvees for the donees' needs!




# **NASASP Historian's Report**

# Important Moments in NASASP History

• 1949: The Federal Property Administrative and Services Act of 1949 is passed. The Act is considered the birth of the modern Federal Personal Property Donation Program.

- 1955: Passage of Public Law 61.
  - Made stock fund surplus donable.
  - Removed restrictions on all surplus property acquired by donation or discount purchase prior to July, 1949.
  - Limited restrictions placed on surplus property donated in the future.
- <u>1976:</u> Passage of Public Law 94-519. NASASP Directors were again key in the passage of this amendment to the Federal Property Act.
  - GSA was formally recognized as the sole Federal agency with Program oversight.
  - GSA Administrator was given power to delegate some GSA responsibilities to other Federal agencies, like DoD, and to offer property to other programs.
  - The first time in law that the State Agencies for Surplus Property were formally recognized.
  - Inserted the Service Educational Activities into the law.
- <u>1997:</u> Passage of Public Law 105-50 allowing providers of assistance to the impoverished to acquire Federal surplus personal property.
- 1999: NASASP Directors, working with the U.S. Small Business
   Administration (SBA) and GSA, penned an agreement to allow small minority businesses to receive Federal surplus personal property.
- 2003: NASASP, working with GSA and TSA, was able to reach an
  agreement for any SASP that desired the property, to pick up
  voluntarily abandoned property at our nation's airports, and bring it
  into their Program for distribution.
- **2013:** NASASP, working with Congress, was able to amend the "For the Vets Act of 2010." The result was the ability to donate Federal surplus personal property to Veterans Service Organizations for any justified use in service to our Veterans. This marked the first amendment to Title 40 since 1997.





# **NASASP** Overseas Facilitator Report



## Successful Shipment from St. Croix!

Recently, we shipped four truck tractors like the one pictured above from St. Croix to Oklahoma. The Oklahoma SASP initially requested them in May of this year. Their request was canceled in June; however, they requested them for a second time on the 28<sup>th</sup> of July.

Originally, I worked with the Pasha Group to move these vehicles as they had provided the best quote. After several weeks, I was told that the shipping line that quoted the shipment would not honor the quote provided, and the new quote would be more than double the original quote. Therefore, I contacted another vendor who had quoted—Surplus Logistics LLC—to see if they could handle the shipment. They assured me that they could handle the shipment although their shipping line would not move the trucks from the current location to the port. We needed a local company to handle the move to the port. I worked with Surplus Logistics LLC, who called several suggested references, but no one would handle the shipment. Finally, the DLA representative, Mr. Pena sent us the name of a contact he had on island, Mr. Rosa Matos. Together, we worked on moving the trucks. Mr. Matos was able to test the trucks and assure us that the trucks were in working order. As all of the batteries were dead, we had to order new batteries. Since these units had military style batteries, the batteries were not available on island and had to be ordered and shipped to the island. Once again, the logistics for this were very complicated, but we worked through them and four weeks later, we had batteries.

Next, we had to work with U.S. customs. It seemed that they are not used to processing U.S. Military items from St. Croix to the USA. We found that even though St. Croix is a U.S. territory, items from there must be processed through U.S. customs. The online customs system did not have provisions in place for shipping the trucks from St. Croix, therefore we had to contact U.S. Customs and the U.S. Census Bureau to determine how to process the trucks for loading and shipping. Three weeks later, including many phone calls with U.S. Customs and the U.S. Census Bureau, we were finally given permission to load and ship these vehicles. The trucks arrived in Oklahoma the last week of November. They are now available to donees in Oklahoma.

Determination and patience on all parts allowed these shipments to prevail.

# **NASASP Government Relations Report**

## Report From the Washington, DC "Swamp:" 2018 National Elections and NASASP

Behind the news headlines, NASASP has been working hard in anticipation of changes resulting from the national elections on November 6th. The goal is to position the organization to network with and influence those new leaders, new and returning members, and key staff in the DoD and GSA regarding important issues going forward. With dozens of new U.S. House and U.S. Senate members and their staffs coming to the Nation's Capitol, we will see new policy and legislative issues for the 116<sup>th</sup> Congress (which convened January 3<sup>rd</sup>, 2019, and will be in place through the 2020 election cycle).

NASASP has reached out to several key Committees in Congress, in addition to the leadership and other members with interests in FSPP matters. These Committees include the U.S. House Oversight and Government Reform and its counterpart in the U.S. Senate, Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs Committee, as well as both the U.S. House and U.S. Senate Armed Services Committees. Major initiatives also include outreach to the U.S. House and U.S. Senate Appropriations Committees. The U.S. House and U.S. Senate Republican and Democrat leadership will announce by mid-January the Committee membership for the new Congress. These will form the basis of NASASP's focus on issues for 2019-2020. There are dozens of new members joining the 435-seat U.S. House. On the Senate side, there will be fewer changes, with five new Members including, Mike Braun (R-IN), Josh Hawley (R-MO), Kevin Cramer (R-ND), Jacky Rosen (D-NV), and Rick Scott (R-FL).

Two key Committees, which have jurisdiction over **GSA** and much of the regulations and statutes governing NASASP actions, have new leadership. **Rep. Elijah Cummings (D-MD)** will be the new Chairperson of the Oversight and Government Reform (OGR) Committee. More importantly, the Government Operations Subcommittee, with specific interest in our positions, will also have a new Chairperson, **Rep. Gerry Connolly (D-VA)**. On the Republican side, most of the past Chairpersons and top members have left the Congress—with almost 50% of the 24 GOP members gone from the Committee. **Rep. Jim Jordan (R-OH)**, a key member on the Committee, is running for Speaker of the House. New GOP Committee leaders may include **Reps. Amash (R-MI)**, **Gosar (R-AZ)**, **DesJarlais (R-TN)** and **Massie (R-KY)**. The OGR Committee previously had a total of 42 House members.

On the Senate side, the Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs Committee has had a major change in the defeat of the Ranking Minority Democrat, Sen. McCaskill (D-MO). By seniority, former Chairman Sen. Carper (D-DE) is next in line and then Sen. Tester (D-MT) who retained his seat. Sen. Heitkamp (D-ND), a member of the Committee, also lost her election and will be replaced. The GOP retains the Chairpersonship with Sen. Johnson (R-WI). There is a total of 15 Senate members on the Committee.

On the DLA and DoD side of our issues, new leadership impacting NASASP is also being watched. **Rep. Adam Smith (D-WA)** will assume the Chairpersonship of the House Armed Services Committee, and **Rep. Thornberry (R-TX)**, reverts to Ranking Minority Member. Most DLA issues come to the Readiness Subcommittee, which will be chaired by **Rep. Bordallo (D-Guam)**, and will have few changes in membership overall. **Rep. Wilson (R-SC)** would be the top "minority" GOP member there.

Since the GOP retained control of the U.S. Senate, the new Chairperson of the Senate Armed Services Committee (critical to our DLA/DoD issues) will be **Sen. Inhofe (R-OK)**, who takes the place of the late Sen. McCain (R-AZ). **Sen. Reed (D-RI)** is still Ranking Minority Member on the Committee. A major change on the Senate Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs Committee is the loss of Ranking Minority Member, **Sen. McCaskill (D-MO).** Final selection for this position may include **Sen. Carper (D-DE)**, former Chairperson.

For NASASP, the next two years of the 116<sup>th</sup> Congress will be busy. Key issues will quickly arise after the February 2019 President's State of the Union and release of his FY2020 federal budget. Among other priorities, these include:

- Legislation to revise Title 40 of U.S. Code, Exchange Sale policy to prioritize donation before exchange/sale;
- Review proposed changes to federal personal property rules or statutes, especially Title 40 "reform;" and
- Prepare for the National Defense Authorization Act's FY2020 process as it relates to DLA and vehicle "scrapping" policy.

2019 will mark a key year for NASASP, fighting to preserve the 70+ year Federal Surplus Property Program so that it may continue to serve the public and the 67,000+ donees around the country. If you can, please assist our government relations objectives as we move forward.
